

Let Freedom Ring throughout the Land

Dear Trinity Presbyterian Church Family & Friends,



The coming every year of July 4th reminds us of the preciousness and value of human freedom. We know, especially as Christians, that you and I are not fully human without freedom—the true freedom that God alone gives us out of his love and grace through his one and only Son, Jesus Christ. Still, the American idealizing of temporal freedom has, since 1776, enhanced respect for individuals, stirred initiative and creativity, and made for tolerance of diversity—all human values. However,

it seems to me that while freedom in the temporal sense is a necessary component of enjoying a full and ethical life, it is not a sufficient component by itself. We are only human in relationship—as we live in community, and the founders of our nation knew that the spirit of individualism is hollow. The pursuit of self-interest by many does not lead to the good of all. Our nation was founded not only upon the idea of freedom, but upon the idea of human solidarity and a practical and spiritual sense of the “common good” that has often been lost in this post-modern society. Perhaps the Apostle Paul says it best in the Scriptures wherein he writes, “Look out not only for your own interests, but also for the interests of others.” (Phil. 2:4) It is a lesson of which our forefathers were keenly aware. They knew that our culture, our nation, and our world needed to see and know of a land where “looking out for the common good” could be lived out in the spirit of freedom under the divine providence of God.

To capture a sense of the value our American ancestors placed on the issue of freedom and its significance upon our common human condition, it might be beneficial for all of us to be reminded of the fiery words of one of our nation’s founding fathers, Patrick Henry, in his extraordinary speech before signing the Declaration of Independence, July 4, 1776 at Independence Hall, Philadelphia: These words will go forth to the world when our bones are dust. To the slave in bondage, they will speak hope; to the mechanic in his workshop, freedom. That parchment will speak to kings in language sad and terrible as the trumpet of the archangel. You have trampled on the rights of mankind long enough. At last, the voice of human woe has pierced the ear of God and called his judgment down. Such is the message of our Declaration to the kings of the world. And shall we falter now? And shall we start back appalled when our free people press the very threshold of freedom? **Sign!** If

Rummage sale round-up – 2023

(This message was originally delivered to the congregation on June 11th)

On behalf of the rummage sale committee, (Karen Perzia, Cindy Williams, Sandy Peoples, Allyson Lord, Nancy Thomas and Kristina Coy, here are some of the details of the success of our annual rummage sale here at Trinity. But before we get to the bottom line, let us quickly review how we got there.

Volunteers - virtually everyone in this congregation played some part in the donation, preparation, and sales at our rummage sale: clothing, household goods, toys, etc. And we thank you so much for your help. The fun and fellowship were great as well. And we received many compliments from our customers on our cleanliness and quality of items for sale.

We had some other folks come in and help us as well. We run the risk of forgetting someone here, but we will take that chance in the name of wanting to be grateful: Allyson Lord's sister Bonnie Zim; Nancy Thomas's sister Diane Klug; Barbara Rinker's husband Dale; and Janet Hunt's husband Fred.

And some of our younger people put in several hours to help: Abbie Coy, Zack Coy, little Drew Fleschut, Grayson McKinley, Bob Stevens, and Michael Williams. Again, if we have missed someone, we apologize. We thank all of you for your help.

On Saturday, around 11:30, when we faced clean up and breakdown of the Miracle Building, and we were all very tired, Cindy Williams and Josh Coy came in with an army of young volunteers in the form of Boy Scout Troop 281. What a blessing. It was cleaned up in no time. And we thank Jane and Kim Evanchik, our church cleaning crew, for coming in on Saturday to clean the church and ready it for the Sunday morning service.

Outreach – on Friday morning people were lined up across the parking lot and around the corner to take advantage of what our sale had to offer. Saturday was also very busy. For a day and a half, we were able to hold this money-saving event for our community. But it did not stop there. At 11:30 on Saturday, items that had not been sold were boxed up for delivery to the Back Mountain Library, the Meadows Market on the Pond, St. Vincent DePaul's soup kitchen, Blue Chip, projects from two other churches and Cintas. All of the left-over clothing was removed from the church on Sunday morning by Cintas, the uniform company. They will wash, sort, and deliver the clothing to disaster areas such as floods and earthquakes so that people in distress at least have clean clothing to wear. So, you see our little church can reach far and wide to help others.

This year we had record sales at our jewelry table. Several people gave us jewelry that was 14K gold and Allyson Lord took the pieces to a local jeweler to sell them. That activity, plus on-site sales, generated more than \$2,500 towards our bottom line. That is a record! The rest of the items for sale brought in \$3,300.

OK – the number you've all been waiting for: net proceeds from the sale are about \$5,800. The dumpster and advertising were donated.

All proceeds will be given to the general operating account to benefit the many programs of our church. Again, many thanks for all of your hard work to make all this happen.

OK, we know we are all Presbyterians, but let us give ourselves a round of applause anyway!

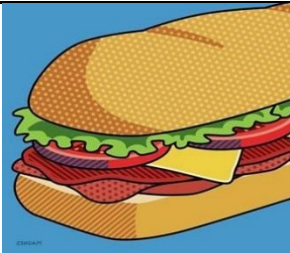
